The World Health Organisation (WHO) defines health as a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely absence of disease.



Average admissions in the PICU are from 450-500 per year, with one-third of patients needing mechanical ventilation. In the conference, there was also a meeting of Indian doctors settled abroad and it was decided to have multicentric studies and research projects involving ICUs in US and India.





WHAT YOU MUST KNOW ABOUT...

Chemical Peelina

What is chemical peeling?

Chemical peeling is a dermatosurgical procedure performed without any surgical instrument. It is relatively painless office procedure with excellent cosmetic results. It revolves around the scientific knowledge of healing pattern of chemical skin burns.

Q2. What is the mechanism of action of chemical peeling?

Ans. It is the application of one or more chemical agents to the skin to cause controlled chemical burns followed by exfoliation and subsequent resurfacing of the epidermis, along with remodelling of collagen & elastin fibers.

Q3. What are the agents used for chemical peeling?

1. α hydroxy acid (35%-70%)

- 2. Trichloro acetic acid (20%-35%)
- 3. α Keto acid (Pyruvic acid etc.)

What are the various indications of chemical peeling? **O4**. **INDICATIONS:**

- 1. Acne
 - > Post-acne hyperpigmentation
 - Superficial scarring following acne
 - Acne excoriata
 - Comedolytic acne
- 2. Dyschromias
 - ➤ Melasma
 - > Fixed drug eruption
 - ➤ Melanosis (photo, diffuse/localized)
 - ➤ Freckles
 - ➤ Lentigenes
 - > Post inflammatory hyperpigmentation
- 3. Aesthetic
 - ➤ Dilated pores
 - Fine wrinkling
 - ➤ Moderate actinic damage and aging

What are the types of chemical peeling? Q5.

Ans. It is of 3 types:

- 1. Superficial depth
- 2. Medium depth
- 3. Deep chemical peels

Superficial and medium depth peels are usually resorted to. Deep peels are hazardous, so are usually avoided.

What are the contra indications of chemical peeling? **O6.** CONTRAINDICATIONS:

- 1. Active infection (herpes labialis/bacterial)
- 2. Open cuts
- 3. Uncooperative patient
- 4. Unrealistic expectations

What are the advantages of chemical peeling?

Ans. 1. Inexpensive & safe OPD procedure

- 2. Minimal complications
- 3. No significant post procedure care
- 4. Adjunct to bleaching agents, retinoic acid etc.
