First "Patient Support Group" meet was held at Dumra Auditorium, in which the problem of obesity and its implications on health were discussed. It was stressed that obesity surgery is not a definitive cure for obesity but is a tool for weight loss.

Dr. PS Nain and Dr. Ashish Ahuja emphasised that obesity is the second most common cause of death from a modifiable behavioural risk factor. Long term implications are obvious from the fact that for every 10 kgs above normal body weight, life expectancy is reduced by 3 years. About 100 patients attended the meet and those who had undergone bariatric surgery shared their experiences with those who plan to get operated. [Pic. A]



531 units of blood were collected in voluntary blood donation camps held in collaboration with the following:



Mammography

A mammography machine with stereotactic biopsy system has been recently installed at DMCH. This new technology will help in prompt and accurate detection of breast cancer that in turn may extend a patient's life by about 20 years.

The latest survey by the Indian Council of Medical Research shows every year one million women are being diagnosed with breast cancer.



Annual screening is recommended for women once they reach 40 years of age and in those with a family history of the disease.

Screening mammography helps in better diagnosis since highly detailed imaging of the breast improves a physician's ability to detect small tumors. When cancers are small, the woman has more treatment options and a cure is more likely.





Operation theatre staff nurse Miss Caroline Hampton used to have allergic reaction to corrosive sublimate (mercuric chloride) which was a commonly used antiseptic for rinsing the instruments before operations.

Dr. William Stewart Halsted (1852-1922) took pity on her and ordered 'Good Year Company' to make rubber gloves for Miss Hampton.

These rubber gloves were later brought into regular use by the surgeons and nursing staff during surgical procedures. Today, we cannot dream of performing such procedures without gloves!

WHAT YOU MUST KNOW ABOUT...

Screening Mammogram

Q. What is a screening mammogram?

A. A screening mammogram is a special x-ray of the breast used to detect changes in women who have no signs nor symptoms of breast cancer, so that suspicious lesions can be picked up at the earliest.

Q. When should screening mammograms be performed?

- A. National Cancer Institute (NCI) recommends that screening mammograms should be carried out as below:
 - a. Women 40 years and above should have mammograms every 1 to 2 years.
 - b. Women at higher risk should have mammograms before the age of 40.

Q. Which women have a high risk of developing cancer breast?

- a. Family history of breast cancer.
 - Women who began having periods before the age of 12 or went through menopause after the age of 55.
 - c. Women who had their first child after the age of 30 or who never had a child.
 - Women who have not breast fed their children.
 - e. Women on hormone replacement therapy for more than 5
 - Women who had radiation therapy to the chest (including the breasts) before the age of 30.

Q. What is the best method of detecting breast cancer as early as possible?

A. Combination of a high quality mammogram and a clinical breast exam on a regular basis is the best method.

Q. How does a patient prepare herself for a mammogram?

- A. a. Wear clothes that are easy to change.
 - b. Should not use deodorant, lotion or powder.

Q. What are some of the limitations of screening mammograms?

- A. a. Dense breast may obscure an underlying neoplasm. In such a patient, regular and close correlation with clinical findings and physical examination is recommended.
 - b. A negative report does not entirely exclude the possibility of malignancy. A negative mammography report should not delay biopsy if a dominant or clinically suspicious mass is present.

Q. What is the Radiation dose in mammography.

A. Radiation dose for standard four film mammography is very low (0.13mSV). This causes negligible / inconsequential increase in the natural cancer incidence rate in women above 40.
