Biomedical Waste Management Week

Coinciding with the World Environment Day observed by WHO, Biomedical Waste Committee organized a one week workshop on "Biomedical Waste Management" for the residents, nursing and para-medical staff. More than 400 medical personnel participated in the sensitization workshop conducted by Dr Gautam Ahluwalia (Convener) and Dr Deepinder Chhina (Co-convener). The aim of the workshop was to conduct an interactive session regarding the day-to-day queries and problems encountered by the hospital employees during the disposal of biomedical waste.

The Government of India notified National Bio-Medical Waste Regulations in July, 1998. It is a statutory requirement for all the health care facilities in the country. The most important aspect in the management of biomedical waste is appropriate segregation as per colour coded containers at the point of generation. Dr Rajoo Singh Chhina (Coordinator) emphasized that biomedical waste and infection control practices are the two very important areas on which the committee is going to concentrate in the coming months. 

Resource faculty and Guest lectures

Dr Sandeep S Sidhu (Gastro) delivered a lecture "Rifaximin improves cognitive functions and Health Related Quality of Life in patients with Minimal Hepatic Encephalopathy" at 'Digestive Diseases Week-2010' at New Orleans, USA. His clinical research paper was selected as the "Distinguished Clinical Practice Paper". [O]



A significant percentage (40.9%) of patients with liver cirrhosis have a complication called Minimal Hepatic Encephalopathy (MHE). It is called minimal because patients have no gross complaints. Clinical examination is normal. These patients however have impaired fine motor skills, attention, concentration and slow speed of mental processing MHE patients have poor health related quality of life. A prospective randomized double blind placebo controlled trial (the RIME trial) was conducted in the Gastroenterology OPD. 486 patients with cirrhosis were screened. 94 patient were diagnosed to have MHE and enrolled. Rifaximin, a non-absorbable gut selective broad spectrum antibiotic (1200mg/1day) significantly improved both the cognitive functions and HRQOL in patients with MHE. It was safe and well tolerated.

Dr Sandeep Kaushal (Pharmacology) delivered a talk on 'Pharmacokinetics / Pharmacodynamics in an era of MDR Gram negative organisms' at a conference on Infection Management in critically ill patients at Mohali.

Dr Sunil Kumar Juneja (Obst & Gynae) was the panelist for the discussion on Heart Disease Complicating Pregnancy at Kangra.

The incidence of heart disease complicating pregnancy is less than 1%; with the ratio of congenital to acquired Rheumatic heart disease being 1:10 in developing countries.

Mitral stenosis is the commonest acquired Rheumatic heart disease. Haemodynamic changes that occur in pregnancy from 6-8th week onwards can get accentuated leading on to Pulmonary oedema & right heart failure and consequent complications.

A multidisciplinary team consisting of an Obstetrician, Cardiologist, Neonatologist and Anaesthesiologist should be involved in the care of such a patient during labour and delivery.



HPV DNA: A screening tool for cancer cervix

O. What is HPV?

A. Human papilloma virus (HPV) is a group of viruses that includes more than 100 different types, more than 40 of which infect the genital area.

Q. How does HPV spread?

A. HPV is spread through sexual contact. Most infected persons are asymptomatic and thus unaware that they are infected and can unintentionally transmit the virus to a sex partner. Rarely, a pregnant woman passes HPV to her baby during vaginal delivery.

Q. How serious is infection with HPV?

A. Most HPV infections do not cause any symptoms and eventually go away, as the body's own defense system clears the virus. Some people get visible genital warts, or have pre-cancerous changes in the cervix, vulva, anus, or penis. About 10% of women infected with HPV develop persistent HPV infection and are at greatest risk for developing cervical cancer.

Q. What cancers does HPV cause in humans?

A. Several types of cancer are associated with HPV:

 Cervical cancer: The most common HPV- associated cancer. Almost all cervical cancers are associated with HPV

Vulvar cancer : 40%
 Vaginal cancer : 70%
 Penile cancer : 40%
 Anal cancer : 85%

Cancers of the head and neck are mostly caused by tobacco and alcohol, but recent studies show that about 25% of mouth and 35% of throat cancers may be linked to HPV.

Q. Is it important to screen for carcinoma cervix & how is it done?

A. Screening is very important and has shown to remarkably reduce the incidence and mortality of cervical cancer. Two techniques are used: PAP smear and HPV DNA testing.

Q. Is HPV DNA screening better than PAP smear?

A. Though PAP screening and HPV DNA testing are done simultaneously, HPV testing is more sensitive than cytology. Demonstration of a carrier status for high risk viruses might identify a high risk group of patients with normal cervical smears.

Q. What are the indications for women to undergo the HPV DNA test?

A. Following are the people who can undergo the test-

- A sexually active woman above the age of 30 years.
- A women having symptoms of pelvic pain / abnormal discharge/intermenstrual bleeding/ post coital bleeding/ menorrhagia
- A women who has at any time in life had abnormal PAP test.

Q. Are the facilities available in DMCH?

A. Complete gynaecological evaluation including PAP smear is routinely available. The Hybrid Capture Assay to detect HPV DNA is available at DMCH which can pick up high risk HPV infections.
